For over 150 years, the Y has played a role helping people of all ages in the greater Kalamazoo community live healthier in spirit, mind and body. And

as our community has grown and changed, so has the Y. From a narrowly focused organization that started out serving men only, we have become a welcoming place for people of all backgrounds. With an inclusive mission and lasting core values, the Y is here today to help all people reach their fullest potential.

As our annual report illustrates, 2016 was a significant year for the YMCA of Greater Kalamazoo. We celebrated and recognized our many achievements as part of our 150<sup>th</sup> versary. We began the first phase of the Building For Generations capital development projects with the addition of the full access locker room at the Portage Y. We significantly lowered our membership rates which created greater access to all in our community regardless of family income. As a result, 21,863 people had memberships at the Y with an additional 7,557 people participating in a Y program.

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# BUILDING FOR GENERATIONS: ACCESS FOR ALL



PHASE I: Thanks to a community of donors who raised \$725, 000, the Y at Centre Street opened its new, all-accessible locker facilities, designed with young families and those with special needs in mind. With 74 lockers, seven private changing and shower stations, and two single-stalled bathrooms, the new locker room and its amenities provides direct access to the pool and offers generous, open space for mobility. For the dad who takes his daughter to swim lessons, and the mom who plans to splash with her sons during family pool time, life has gotten a little easier.

#### **Project Description:**

#### New Healthy Kids & Family Center and Kids Zone

 Renovate 3,000 sq. ft. of program space into a multi-use space serving youth, teens, and families

.....

- Increase dedicated youth space from 800 sq. ft. to 3,000 sq. ft.
- Interactive activity area that integrates technology with exercise and active play
- Activity rooms or meeting spaces for classes and programs
- Quiet zone for reading, homework time, or conversation **Why now:**
- Youth need to be engaged in active play and learn that being active throughout life leads to long term health
- Teens need multiple support approaches to be successful

**PHASE II:** The YMCA Building for Generations Campaign raised \$3.8 million toward \$5 million to begin executing exciting significant physical changes throughout the facility in order to create a more accessible, functional and welcoming building. Major project components will include:

- A new entrance
- A Kids Zone and community room
- Expanded social space
- Full access restrooms
- Updated and remodeled youth & family and wellness areas

The artist's renderings shows a new, one-point entry with natural lighting, connecting the tennis area and main lobby, leading to main programming areas, to include a new full-access elevator.



#### Benefits:

- Increase capacity to serve teens after school, and youth in evenings and on weekends
- Program space that promotes being active (addresses achieving healthy weight in children)



New Healthy Kids & Family Center and Kids Zone, concepts only.

#### PHASE III: Project Description: New zero-depth lap and family pool

- Replace existing small pool with a signature multi-purpose warm water pool and a full-access locker room
- Significantly increase the size from 1,200 sq. ft. to 3,300 sq. ft.

#### Why now:

- Increasing population of seniors who need water exercise
- Increased demand for affordable family activities
- Existing pool is slowly sinking and mechanical systems are failing

#### **Benefits:**

- With three activity areas, the new pool will provide a significant increase in instructional opportunities for all ages
- People with mobility issues can access pool with dignity
- Ability to serve more families with increased availability of dedicated family swim times that will increase from 4.5 hours per week to 15 hours per week
- Ability to provide aquatic programs for people with special needs

- Add natural light and better ventilation
- Replace filtering system in the large lap pool with energy efficient filters
- Add a handicap-accessible locker room adjacent to the pools

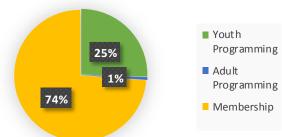

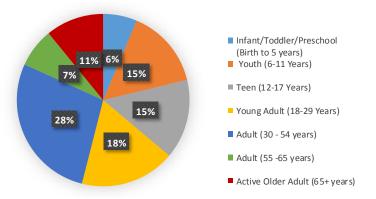

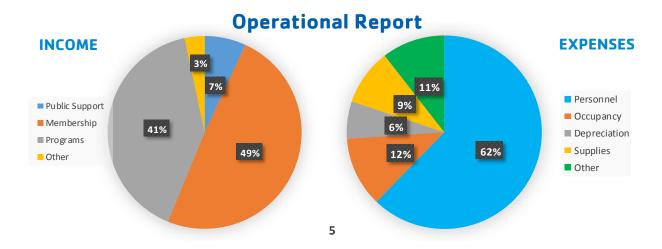

### **Chronic Disease Programs**

Chronic disease has been described as a growing crisis in the United States by health and economic experts as statistics show devastating impact on quality of life and significant loss of life. As such, the Y identifies Chronic Disease as a priority and offers programs to meet critical community needs. In 2016, we saw an increase in the number of persons seeking support.
